Focus: Towns of origin, pre-immigration names, family relationships, immigration paths

BEFORE USING RECORDS IN THE COUNTRY OF ORIGIN

Basics

- Interview family near and far
- Work backwards and gather as much info as possible: Records, newspapers, family photos and letters in USA, Canada, Scotland, Europe, Ukraine
- Research extended family and in-laws and reach out to their family historians
- Use every name variation you can think of when searching databases and browsing records (both first names and surnames)
- Get help with translations of records (and understand the purpose of the records)

Towns:

- Start where you are and work backwards
 - Naturalization papers
 - Immigration papers
 - Passenger lists
 - Vital records
 - WWI and WWII draft registration cards (and service records)
 - Widen the search to as many family members as possible, including in-laws
- Start where you are and work forwards
 - Contact relatives
 - Check family trees posted online for ideas
- Create a list/inventory of possible towns

Names:

- Use Alexander Beider's books on names to develop a list of possible variants for first and last names
- Explore records to find name variants and potential original name

Relationships:

• Chart out what you know or think (be clear on what's firm and confirmed and what's lore or a hypothesis)

GOING TO RECORDS FROM COUNTRY OF ORIGIN: Russian Records for Ukraine

- Search the JewishGen database
 - 1. Donate at least \$100 to JewishGen
 - 2. Go to JewishGen
 - 3. Use the JewishGen Unified search https://www.jewishgen.org/databases/all/ or the Ukraine Database search https://www.jewishgen.org/databases/Ukraine/
 - 4. Search on Surname "phonetically like" and "sounds like"
 - 5. Search on Town "phonetically like" and "sounds like"

- 6. Can use wild cards
- 7. EXPERIMENT!!!!
- Always look at the original document and get other information translated
- Always get the title of the original document
 - 1. Note the Archive Reference (e.g., ДАКО/1/129/731)
 - 2. Go to the original records https://uk.wikisource.org/wiki/Apxi8:Єврейське містечко
 - 3. Translate the page
 - 4. Select the district (e.g., Kyiv province, Tarashchan district)
 - 5. Search on a part of the archive ID (e.g., 731)
 - 6. Find the file (e.g., <u>Відпуск грошей із залишків коробкового збору євреям</u> містечка П'ятигори. 1893 // ДАКО. Ф. 1. Оп. 129. Спр. 731)
 - 7. Cut and paste the title and translate it in Google Translate (or similar tool). E.g., Releasing money from the remains of the box tax to the Jews of the town of Pyatihora. 1893

Immigration Journey

- Search family, in-laws, associates
 - Census records
 - Naturalization records
 - Passenger lists
 - Vital records (Marriage, birth, death)
 - Military records
 - Newspapers
- JewishGen Immigration Study Group—worth the cost!
- Interviews, emails, messages to other researchers on web sites
- Family documents: oral histories, photos, letters
- Books about immigration
- Newspapers articles about the ships
- Maps
- Travel guides
